## THE CFUW CHARITABLE TRUST AND THE FELLOWSHIPS PROGRAM

Since 1920, CFUW has administered the Fellowships Program. The funding for the awards came from CFUW until 1967 when the Charitable Trust was established. The mandate of the Charitable Trust is:

To award fellowships to women university graduates for advanced study and research. The amounts, conditions and recipients of such fellowships shall be determined by the CFUW Fellowships Committee within the overall budget established by the Trustees.

Each year, the CFUW Charitable Trust allocates an amount for fellowship awards which comes from the interest that they earn on their capital and the donations that Clubs and individuals generously contribute. In 2018-2019 the Trust paid \$99,000.00 for awards plus \$4,000.00 for two Library/creative arts awards (this was an exception for the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year). It should be noted that the Charitable Trust does not go into a deficit position. The Charitable Trust's operational support has been affected as a consequence of the biennial CFUW AGMs, since the CFUWCT Boutique and breakfasts have been an important source of funding for the Trust.

## DIVISION OF LABOUR BETWEEN THE CHARITABLE TRUST AND CFUW

The primary role of the Charitable Trust is to be the "bank" and raise funds for the award of fellowships to women. The role of CFUW is to administer the Fellowships Program which involves preparing application forms, receiving applications, processing filing fees, reviewing applications for completeness, responding to inquiries from applicants. The Fellowships Committee reports to the Charitable Trust but works very closely with the Fellowships Program Manager on the review of applications. The Fellowships Program Manager assists the Trust in publicizing the awards and winners; working to prepare their annual report; supporting the work of the 100th Anniversary Scholarship Project; preparing resources for the CFUW AGM; and posting and keeping updated the Fellowships web page; and other related duties.

## WHO PAYS FOR WHAT?

From 1920 to 2017, CFUW had been paying for the administration of the Fellowships Program with a nominal amount of operation funds supplied by the CFUW CT. The filing fees go directly to CFUW to offset the costs of the program's administration. The Trust pays for printing, rent, shipping, translation, insurance, audit and pays directly for the software program for on-line applications (\$10,000) and other items invoiced by suppliers. The Fellowships Program Manager provides some CFUWCT website content, but the design and maintenance is paid directly by the Trust.

After negotiations between the CFUW CT and CFUW an agreement was reached and the CFUW CT now pays \$20,000 per annum for administrative costs. CFUW eliminated the cost of face-to-face meetings for the Fellowships Committee and for a transitional year these were paid for by the Trust. In the past year the Fellowship meetings were held by teleconference and e-mail, reducing administration costs. The Charitable Trust and the CFUW worked with the Fellowships Committee to provide a smooth transition for this part of the committee's work. Changes are being made to the Fellowships Committee operation to facilitate this transition, primarily increasing the number of members to the Fellowships Committee and more consistent scheduling of teleconferences.

# Message from the Chair

## *Message de la présidente*

The Charitable Trust is now operating with a renewed Fellowship Committee membership and process. We are using the online application system for applicants for Fellowships and a teleconference decision making process for the Fellowship Committee. We have been able to significantly increase the number of bilingual Fellowship Committee members, thus serving well the francophone applicants. The transition to this new process has been led by the Chair of the Fellowship Committee, Charlotte Rigby, with excellent staff support from Betty Dunlop.

We are deeply indebted to these women and to the Fellowship Committee – which took the ‘leap of faith’ - helping make this ‘new way of working’ so successful. Perhaps we were prescient, since in this new COVID-19 influenced world, we would have had no choice but to have virtual decision making. The process worked even more smoothly this year – perhaps because, confined to their quarters, committee members had ‘nowhere to go’. Teleconferences were reduced to a third of what they had been the year before.

The Board showed their appreciation to Betty and Charlotte and the Fellowship Committee members by presenting them with awards of appreciation at the CFUW AGM Charitable Trust breakfast in Winnipeg last year.

We know that it is vital that CFUW members understand the work of the Charitable Trust and thus we have produced a video, in celebration of the 100 years of CFUW, that outlines the role of the Trust and has some very insightful interviews with previous Fellowship winners.

This year we will be awarding, for the first time, the CFUW 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Legacy Fellowship. The Fellowship is awarded to a woman who has completed one calendar year of a doctoral program, at the time of application. The Ph.D. thesis research/project must focus on advancing gender equality. It is not restricted to a specific field of studies. The Fellowship is tenable in Canada or abroad. We have endowed this new Fellowship through combining a very generous \$100,000 contribution we received last year, adding unallocated funds from the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Scholarship committee, and the funds contributed in memory of Susan Murphy and Denise Nahirney. This biennial award will honour recently deceased members – this year it will honour Susan Murphy who had been both a past CFUW president and a president of the CFUW CT. We are encouraging Clubs and individuals to use the new legacy donation option for members who pass away – you can access this option at our website <https://cfuwcharitabletrust.ca/>.

We are deeply thankful for the work that Lynn Franklin and the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Scholarship Committee did in raising the funds for the Trust. We are sorry that Lynn’s tenure as the Trust’s bookkeeper is coming to an end. She has been an important support of the Trust and we have welcomed her positive energy.

The Trust remains an effective way to support the mission of CFUW – to support the education of girls and women. The Board followed the government decision- making around COVID-19, wanting to ensure that students

were carefully considered in the outstanding economic shutdown. With the new advocacy measures introduced by government, the CFUW CT was able to take a proactive role in advocating for measures to support students.

We worked with the CFUW Advocacy Committee, reaching out across the country. Many CFUW Clubs and Councils wrote letters to governments urging them to include students in their planning. We have been grateful for the measures taken to date, but it does point out how important Scholarships, Fellowships and support to educational opportunities are going to be in the near future.

The CFUW CT will hold a virtual AGM in the Fall on October 16 and we hope Clubs will be able to join us in the afternoon for an exciting speaker. We will keep you informed as it becomes clearer when the current crisis will be over. Please be assured that CFUW CT trustees are committed to careful stewardship of your contributions ensuring the future vitality and viability of the Trust.

Thank you to all of the volunteers who have contributed so much throughout the years and thank you for your support!

*La Fondation fonctionne maintenant avec un comité des bourses de recherche dont la membricité et le processus ont été remaniés. Nous utilisons le système de demande de bourses en ligne et un processus de prise de décisions par téléconférence. Nous avons pu accroître considérablement le nombre de membres bilingues du comité, ce qui a aidé à desservir les candidates francophones. La transition vers ce nouveau processus a été dirigée par la présidente du comité, Charlotte Rigby, avec un excellent soutien administratif de Betty Dunlop.*

*Nous devons beaucoup à ces femmes et au comité des bourses de recherche qui ont accepté et favorisé la mise en œuvre réussie de ce nouveau processus. Peut-être avons-nous été des visionnaires puisque dans ce nouveau monde touché par la COVID-19, nous n'aurions pas eu d'autres choix que d'adopter une prise de décisions virtuelle. Le processus a encore été plus harmonieux cette année – peut-être parce que nos membres étaient confinées chez elles avec plus de contrôle de leur temps. Nous avons eu besoin seulement d'un tiers du nombre de téléconférences, comparativement à l'an passé.*

*Le conseil a démontré son appréciation des efforts de Betty et Charlotte ainsi que des membres du comité des bourses de recherche en leur présentant des prix d'appréciation lors du déjeuner de la Fondation de la FCFDU qui a eu lieu pendant l'assemblée générale annuelle de l'an dernier à Winnipeg.*

*Nous savons qu'il est essentiel que tous les membres de la FCFDU comprennent bien le travail de la Fondation et nous avons donc créé une vidéo en l'honneur du centenaire de la FCFDU qui souligne le rôle de la Fondation et comprend des entrevues très intéressantes avec d'anciennes lauréates de bourses.*

*Cette année, nous présenterons pour la première fois la bourse de recherche du centenaire de la FCFDU. Cette bourse est décernée à une femme qui a achevé une année civile d'un programme de doctorat au moment de la demande. Le projet/la thèse de recherche doctorale doit promouvoir l'égalité des sexes. Cette bourse n'est pas restreinte à un domaine d'études particulier. La bourse peut être utilisée au Canada ou à l'étranger. Elle a été dotée en combinant une contribution très généreuse de 100 000 \$ reçue l'an dernier, à laquelle nous ajoutons des fonds non alloués du comité des bourses d'études de notre 100<sup>e</sup> anniversaire ainsi que les fonds contribués à la mémoire de Susan Murphy et Denise Nahirney. Ce prix biennal honorera des membres récemment décédées. Cette année, le prix honorera Susan Murphy – qui a occupé le poste de présidente de la FCFDU et de présidente de la Fondation. Nous encourageons les clubs et les membres à utiliser la nouvelle option de don de cette bourse de recherche commémorant les membres décédées en visitant <https://cfuwcharitabletrust.ca/> sur notre site Web.*

*Nous sommes profondément reconnaissantes pour le travail de Lynn Franklin et du comité des bourses d'études du centenaire qui ont œuvré fort pour recueillir les fonds pour la Fondation. Nous sommes désolées de voir arriver la fin du mandat de Lynn comme comptable de la Fondation. Elle a été un appui constant de la Fondation et nous avons beaucoup apprécié son énergie si positive.*

Nicole has followed her passion studying Indigenous health and primary health care accessibility in rural communities for her undergraduate degree. She is continuing her studies in a Master of Science program at UBC, where she also works as a graduate research assistant at the Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP). Nicole's thesis work has been developed in collaboration with community partners at HELP and the Aboriginal Steering Committee. Her research will focus on utilizing parent-toddler data (TDI- Toddler Development Instrument) collected from communities across BC to assess toddler well-being in communities, as a way to better understand how Indigenous families are accessing primary health care and community resources. This project will be used to identify resource gaps and barriers to care, and to help communities and stakeholders distribute their resources according to the needs of families.

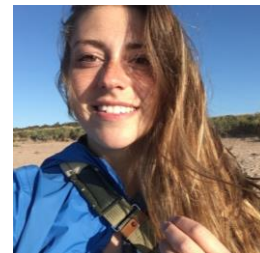

# CFUW 100th Anniversary Legacy Fellowship

**Dedicated in 2020 to Susan Murphy (1950-2019)**

Susan Murphy served as a Past National President of CFUW (2010-2014). She was also a Past Chair of the CFUW Charitable Trust Board (2012-2016).

Susan helped kick-off the CFUW 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Campaign to raise an additional \$100,000 for scholarships, fellowships, and awards. In the late summer of 2014, she had walked the Camino de Santiago trail in Spain, raising almost \$18,000 for the Charitable Trust's Fellowship and Award Fund.



The education of girls and women was something that Susan believed in and she devoted time and expertise to contributing to this cause. The CFUW Charitable Trust and CFUW members acknowledge Susan's strong leadership by awarding the inaugural CFUW 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Legacy Fellowship in Susan's memory.

The Fellowship is awarded to a woman who has completed one calendar year of a doctoral program, at the time of application. The Ph.D. thesis research/project must focus on advancing gender equality. It is not restricted to a specific field of studies. The Fellowship is tenable in Canada or abroad.

**Fellowship Amount:** \$5,000

**Tenure Period:** 2021-2022 Academic Year

**Frequency of Fellowship:** Biennial

## Eligibility Criteria

- The Ph.D. thesis research/project must focus on advancing gender equality. It is not restricted to a specific field of studies.
- Some examples falling within our criteria:
  - 1) Thesis/project in the field of Law or International Law on access to justice for Aboriginal women.
  - 2) Thesis/project in the field of International Development on an intersectional feminist approach to international cooperation.
  - 3) Thesis/project in the field of Philosophy in Pharmacy on sex and gender bias in clinical research.
  - 4) Thesis/project in the field of Computer Science focusing on exploring the gender bias in big data.
- The Ph.D. thesis/project must be well defined in terms of objectives, implementation, and expected results.
- The Fellowship is tenable in Canada or abroad.





# Fellowships Committee Volunteer Reviewers

The 2019-2020 Fellowships Committee members come from CFUW clubs across Canada - from Vancouver to Fredericton. We represent a variety of academic backgrounds, careers and life experience; each of us brings a unique perspective to our committee discussions.

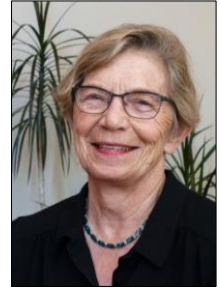
The CFUW Charitable Trust Fellowships and Awards are designed to support postgraduate studies (i.e. Masters, Ph.D. or equivalents.) An exception is the CFUW *Aboriginal Women's Award* for a Canadian indigenous woman studying in Canada for a first degree or license in specific fields, including Medicine, Law, Optometry or Nursing, or a Master's degree in a field dealing with current Canadian aboriginal issues.

This year we received and reviewed some 263 applications (21 were submitted in French.) Once again we worked with the online system *Fluid Review*, and conducted our meetings and discussions by teleconference calls.

We awarded 14 fellowships and awards with a total value over \$100,000 for the academic year 2020-2021. Our winners include scholars and researchers in a variety of fields: biology, ecology, molecular technology, chemistry and engineering, sociology, statistics, history, gender studies, education, and more. We were very impressed by the high quality of all the applications, and by the achievements of these outstanding Canadian women. We feel that we have been privileged to share in CFUW's support for their achievements and future careers.

We thank the Board members of the Charitable Trust for their ongoing support, and we especially thank Program Manager Betty Dunlop for her exceptional guidance, support and expertise during this important and exciting initiative.

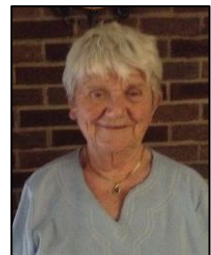

# CFUW Library Award Winner 2020

The winner of the CFUW Library Award is **Saanich School District 63 Individual Learning Centre (ILC)**. The project title is *Hummingbird Project – Building Understanding & Reconciliation*. CFUW Saanich Peninsula was the nominating CFUW Club.

Saanich School District (SD63) is located on the Saanich Peninsula and includes four local Indigenous villages: Tsawout, Tsartlip, Tseycum, and Pauquachin. The school, SD63 Individual Learning Centre, is the alternate public high school in the district. It provides a standard BC Ministry of Education 9-12 curriculum through a different approach than a traditional classroom. ILC is a school of choice.

The project will create an inviting space and build a collection for students to explore and share Indigenous stories, history and landscape knowledge. The collection will include books with primarily written text, with graphic text, and with text supported with audio; videos; and digital resources. Items in the collection will provide access for varied reading levels, and will support literacy development.

The intent of the Hummingbird Project is to foster reconciliation by creating a space and offering a collection that invite the Indigenous and non-Indigenous students of our school to learn about each other and the traditional territory they live on; to share their stories; and to strengthen their confidence as learners. For many of our Indigenous students and their families, this project is also about building trust in the school system as a place where they are valued and experience success. When students see themselves and their culture reflected in educational resources, students feel they belong and are motivated to learn.



**The CFUW Library Award was created to promote literacy and learning by supporting innovative approaches, encouraging community involvement and advocating for the Canadian library system. The amount of the award is normally \$4,000 and is set by the CFUW Charitable Trust budget.**

**CFUW offers a Library Award every two years which is available to:**

- **Academic institutions, community centres, cultural centres, youth organizations or any community based organization/team/group.**

**Submissions must be nominated by a CFUW Club local to the applicant.**

# Treasurer's Report

# *Rapport de la trésorière*

We are extremely grateful for the generosity of Clubs, members and friends who have contributed to the Trust over the past year. Their financial encouragement has helped put us in a strong position to weather stormy times and the volatile financial markets which will persist through the upcoming year. In particular we must thank individual members and Clubs who have donated in memorium.

Our investments are doing well thanks to the guidance of Andrew Posthumus of HollisWealth who manages our portfolio adhering to an investment policy developed over time by the Charitable Trust board and reviewed each year. The portfolio has had a return of approximately -9.53% over the past year. The return shows that the portfolio has mitigated the sudden down turn that culminated in a bottom on March 23<sup>rd</sup> 2020. The volatility has been extraordinary resulting in incredible job loss. We are in unprecedented times. The current interest environment has also made dramatic moves as a result of global central banks stepping in. The US 10 year treasury is at .72%. The Trust portfolio is well positioned regarding debt instruments (preferred shares, money markets and cash) and we own high quality, dividend-producing equities. We welcome inquiries regarding the details of our holdings.

Le portefeuille a réalisé un rendement d'environ -9,53 % au cours du dernier exercice. Ce rendement indique que le portefeuille a limité le ralentissement soudain des marchés qui*

*a atteint son plancher le 23 mars 2020. La volatilité des marchés a été assez extraordinaire et a causé une perte d'emplois incroyable. Nous vivons des moments sans précédent. Les taux d'intérêt actuels ont également connu des changements dramatiques avec l'intervention des banques centrales mondiales. Le taux d'intérêt sur les bons du trésor américains à dix ans est passé à 0,72 %. Le portefeuille de la Fondation est bien placé concernant ses instruments de créance (actions privilégiées, marchés monétaires et liquidités) et nous détenons des actions de bonne qualité rapportant des dividendes. Nous sommes heureux de répondre aux demandes concernant les détails de nos actifs.*
